

Gardening the Soul

Where I come from, in Dingle on the southwest coast of Ireland, we never say that someone has died, but that they are gone on the way of truth – imithe ar slí no firinne. Our fear of death is a resistance to that natural order and flow of life. We forget our place in a bigger picture and view death as an unnatural event, which robs us of our joy in living. Dr. Elisabeth Kubler-Ross speaks of death as a natural transition into beauty and harmony. She believes that death is really a birthday, that death is merely a doorway into a love-filled tomorrow. We walk to the door when the time is right, and it will be open for us into peace beyond our understanding.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK....

Wed 18 - St. Flannan – lived in the seventh century and was the son of a king of Thomond. He entered Molua's monastery at Killaloe and became abbot there. He is remembered as a great preacher.

Fri 20 - St. Fachanan – although little is known with certainty about Fachanan, a strong tradition from early times links him with Kilfenora and records that he founded a church or monastery there in the sixth century. He is venerated as the patron of the Diocese of Kilfenora, now part of Galway.

Sat 21 - St Peter Canisius – 1521 – 97, was born in Holland. He intended to become a lawyer but joined the Jesuits. Through courtesy and learning he promoted the Catholic revival after the Council of Trent. His greatest work was a catechism of 211 questions and answers, published in 1555.

Q. Why is the third Sunday of Advent called Gaudete Sunday?

A. Gaudete is the Latin word for rejoice. The penitential of purple time of Advent gives way to joy because the birthday of the Lord is so near. The key reading for this Sunday is Paul's letter to the Philippians. Paul was locked up in prison when he wrote this letter, but his inner joy was intense because of his conviction that the Lord was very



near. We allow far too many events and concerns to distract our minds from God. Advent is a challenge to simplify and refocus. One will find that this is the way to peace and joy.
