### **Saints of the week....**

**Mon 13 – St. Hilary** – c. 315 – c367, was elected bishop of Potiers and distinguished himself by his stand against Arianism. In exile (356-59) by order of the emperor, he used his time to write. His major works include *De Trinitate*, a study of the Trinity.

**Wed 15 – St. Ita** – was born in Co.

Waterford of noble and Christian parents. Early on she set her mind on serving Christ in religious life. She founded a monastery in Killeedy, Co. Limerick, which attracted a great variety of young people. She was given the title 'foster-mother of the saints of Ireland'. She died in 570.

**Thurs 16 – St. Fursa** – was born in Ireland and became one of the great monastic missionaries abroad. He went first with his brothers Foillan and Ultan to live the monastic life in East Anglia. But as great numbers continued to visit him there he left Foillan as abbot and sought refuge in France around 644. A patron gave him a hermitage at Lagny on the Marne. He died around 650 and was buried in Péronne, a great centre of devotion to him.

**Friday 17 – St Anthony** – died around 356, 'Father of monasticism,' lived a life of solitude but also attracted many others to form communities of hermits.
