Questions People Ask!

Q. Could you tell me something about the life of St. Anthony?

A St. Anthony was born in Portugal of a noble family. He joined the Franciscans and after a short while in Africa he returned to Europe. He was a brilliant theologian and taught theology at various universities, but it was as a preacher that he attained great fame. He was a charismatic figure and attracted such large crowds that he had to teach in the market places as the churches were too small to hold all who wanted to hear him. He died in Padua at the young age of thirty six. He became known as the wonder-worker due to the great number of miracles worked through his intercession. His feast day is on June 13th.

Gardening the Soul



Many people think of prayer as an activity to be added to their daily tasks, but prayer is not to be confused with saying prayers. If we see prayer as wholehearted living it is easier to recognise prayer as an attitude that characterises all our activities.

The more we come alive and awake, the more everything we do becomes prayer. If prayerfulness is our highest degree of aliveness, the starting point must be whenever and wherever we are most alive. That may be when we recite a psalm; when we eat or drink, or when we walk with openness and wonderment. What matters is prayer, not prayers.
