St. John's – did you know?

The windows behind the altar are a pictorial history of the old parish of St. John's with an amalgamation of St. Lawrence's, St. Mary's and St. John's. In fact the churches of St. Lawrence and St. Mary's would have been known in olden times as St. John's Without.

Did you know that the left hand window behind the main altar shows the kneeling figure of Most Rev. Dr. Foran Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, who built St. John's Church and who died on May 11th 1855 not long after the building was completed. In his hands is a drawing of the church (quite easily recognised) as it was during that time.

Worth going to the altar to have a look!
